Family Day weekend with events for everyone – chili, fire trucks and hotdogs.



Patrons to the Baysville Library will no longer be seeing the familiar face of Linda Lacroix behind the checkout desk. After 30 years of being employed with the Township of Lake of Bays, our friendly librarian has decided to close this chapter of her life and retire.

Linda began working at the Baysville Library in 1989, running a children's story hour every Saturday. At that time, the Library was in the seniors building with Jeanie Young as librarian. In 1991, the library

was moved across the parking lot into the new addition that had been added onto the Community Centre. Then, seventeen years later another new addition of 1800 square feet was added.

"We moved back to the seniors building (formerly my old school) in 2008 while the new addition was being built and then back over to the new space in 2009, says Linda. "I always thought it was funny that I went to school in the seniors building and just kept moving back and forth throughout my career." She also tells about when she was a kid that the Library was in one of the dressing rooms in the old arena.

Linda took over as head Librarian in 1994, but her position didn't become full time until 1996 when she became Lake of Bays CEO/Branch Librarian, heading both Baysville and Dwight libraries, while running the Baysville branch.

Although, Linda was responsible for implementing most of the programs in Baysville, she says that she can't take



credit for any of the improvements. "I am so grateful for having and amazing Library board and the Friends of the Library group behind me. They both have supported me every step of the way and have made my job so easy. Without this support of the FOL, the Library Board, and the Township of Lake of Bays, as well as my great staff, the Baysville Library wouldn't be what it is today."

Linda retired this past April 30th. Replacing her as CEO/ Branch Librarian for both libraries is Cathy Fairbairn who has been with

the Dwight library Branch since 2006. Lizann Brunskill has taken over as head librarian in Baysville, with Stacey Irving as her sidekick. Lizann has some very large shoes to fill, but with Linda taking her under her wing the past 8 years, we are sure she too, will do an amazing job.






Lake of Bays FireStation 40 News

2017 was an interesting year for Station 40. We responded to two significant storms. In May a storm resulted in multiple bush fires and a garage fire. Then the July 7 evening storm. Due to the storms impact, we along with Dorset Fire, temporarily closed highway 117. In addition, we had crews spread across highway 117, up Brunel and through the Ril Lake area investigating the impact of the storm. Although a busy night, thankfully there were no injuries reported by the community, nor to your firefighters.

Sadly, in the early part of 2018 there have been a number of fire deaths in Ontario. It has been determined in these cases that there were no working smoke or carbon monoxide alarms in the homes. Please ensure you have working smoke and carbon monoxide alarms in your home and you test them monthly. If you have questions regarding your alarms, drop by the hall any Tuesday night, we'd be happy to help you.

2017 saw the retirement of three members; Captain Morris Bryant, Firefighter Fred Bozek and Firefighter




We will again run a recruit training in the fall and should start the recruiting process in late July/early August. If you are interested in becoming a





Road Safety Forum Takes Place ~ A Report

Muskoka road safety is back in the news for this coming season ~ not that it ever left us. Recently, on March 6th, The District of Muskoka Engineering & Public Roads Department hosted a public forum, entitled, Muskoka Safe Roads Campaign which brought together O.P.P., District of Muskoka, community groups and private sector contributors from across our region as interested stakeholders.

SPEED LIMIT 50

It's goal was to share in a Muskoka-wide partnership to ~~ SLOW DOWN traffic speed and reduce aggressive driving behaviours ~~ REDUCE DISTRACTED DRIVING and to SHARE THE ROAD.

The presenters were able to share what has been ongoing over the recent past regarding the deployment of the O.P.P. Radar speed board (portable speed radar sign); attending to requests to analyze speed limits and the installation of vehicle activated traffic devices (digital radar signs) designed to help moderate traffic speeds. Regarding this last item, Baysville has been identified as the location of two of these electronic signs for this coming spring season. As well, the committee involving Commander John Graham of Huntsville O.P.P. detailed

the traffic statistics for 2017 in Muskoka and outlined the specific traffic safety campaigns planned for summer weekends in our area. Many ideas were proposed and exchanged by residents and commercial concerns for consideration and now the effort will be directed toward formulating the Safe Roads Campaign format for all of Muskoka.

As the result of efforts initiated last summer here in Baysville, comparative statistics are being gathered as this article is being prepared. The surveillance camera used last spring has been re installed within the town limits and out of this effort, Lake of Bays Councilor Glover and O.P.P. Commander Graham scheduled another community meeting on April 16, 2018 to share results and invite your involvement.

Change is taking place, albeit slowly. Many contacts with commercial companies have already been made to solicit their involvement for this community's efforts and their enthusiastic support is already taking place. Everyone is encouraged to do their part in making Baysville the safest town in Muskoka as we look forward to another fine summer for all to enjoy. As one newspaper headline stated, "Driving in Baysville, Use your brakes!"

Happenings at the Baysville Curling Club

As curling draws to an end, I would like to reflect on the past season and let the Lake of Bays Community know just how active the club was and what the near future holds for the club.

Curling often gets a boost in popularity during Olympic years. Our national results, although mixed, will no doubt increase curling's exposure, especially in the new sport called mixed doubles curling where we won a gold medal. Adding to this popularity was

Huntsville's hosting of the Ontario men's provincials, the Tankard. About 20 members of the Baysville Curling Club volunteered at the event. This was the highest, proportionately, number of volunteers from one club.

Our club recently hosted the men's bonspiel, now called the Dorset Timber Mart spiel. The spiel first started in the late 50's and was played at the old arena originally. Twelve teams vied for the new cup (formerly known as the Bigwin trophy). It is a much-loved spiel and our club does a great job of providing curling fellowship and providing great food and fun.

Plans are under way in conjunction with the Riverfront Group to host the 20th annual Surf and Turf. One of

The curling club's granite stones will soon be approaching their life's end. The club will be acquiring new or re-conditioned granite stones. We are receiving a generous trade-in for our 60-year-old blue hone granite stones. Besides an ice plant, granite stones will be any curling club's most expensive purchase. Granite curling stones can last up to 50 years so our rocks have lived beyond their

expectation.

The club's summer twin sport, the bocce club created the 4th court last fall, with the aid of a district grant and will be looking for new members this year. Thirty two people will be able to play simultaneously, starting in July, every Thursday evening, using the 4 courts beside the curling club. Last year there were more folk interested than could play and we had to run 2 starting times. Hopefully we don't have to do that with the 4th court now functional.

Harriet Muirhead

On her first visit to Lake of Bays, Harriet Muirhead arrived in her parents' arms. It was 1936, and they had travelled by car from Toronto to the cabin her grandfather Muirhead had built in 1903. Today, Harriet's home stands on that spot.

Harriet has fond memories of past summers, with her grandfather's stories of rowing his boat everywhere, claiming there were 365 miles of shoreline, one for every day of the year! He was known for the large amount of

fish he caught every time he was out. While her grandfather preferred rowing, she remembers her parents and their friends in their finery running their outboards to go for dinner and dancing at Bigwin Inn.

Cottagers relied on many local people to maintain and service their summer homes. Among them, Harriet remembers: Ross Heney, of Heney Lake, delivering chicken and lamb; Mr. Goss, a nearby farmer who sold fresh vegetables; and Mrs. Robertson, a lady famous for her baking. Sometimes, Harriet and her mother travelled by train to Bracebridge, then took Kelly's Transportation to Baysville, occasionally driven by a very young Barry Walsh.

When asked what changes she has seen in Baysville over the years, Harriet states it hasn't changed a great deal but mentions the existence of a library, the new use of the arena roof as an energy source, and improvements initiated by the Riverside and Community Groups.

Harriet's childhood home was situated in an area of North York now known as Toronto's Armour Heights, where earlier Muirheads had served as Reeves. Its view overlooked Hoggs' Hollow and the Jolly Miller Skating Rink. Frequently, she and her best friend took the shortcut to the skating rink, sliding down the steep hill and

crossing busy Yonge St. This, of course, necessitated quite a climb back on their return!

After university, Harriet enrolled in Toronto Teachers' College and embarked on a career which took her to Kingston, ON, Scotland, and back to North York. For twenty-nine years, she taught English, History, and Geography to Grades 7, 8, and 9, in the classroom and outdoors. She particularly enjoyed her Outdoor Ed experiences with

students, because, free of classroom restraints, they were able to be more themselves. Excursions took them to Camp Kandelore, Laurentian Lodge on Kawagama Lake, and The Frost Centre. Harriet says that, while her father taught her to paddle, she learned most of her outdoor skills from her students. To this day, five of them remain in close contact with her.

Her parents taught her the value of volunteering, particularly her mother, whose activities included being The Tuesday Captain of the Five Fifty-Five Shop at Sick Children's Hospital. Harriet believes youngsters involved in volunteering learn important life skills like commitment and responsibility. Upon retirement in 1993, Harriet became a full time resident of Lake of Bays, and in 1994, put her skills to work for this community by responding to a call for a committee to plan a Vision for the township. She also became a member of the Baysville Community Group, The Lake of Bays' Heritage Foundation, and is currently a member of the Municipal Heritage Group. She has found the great advantage of volunteering is getting to know this community and its many interesting people. In turn, this community has certainly benefitted from the enthusiasm and knowledge of Harriet Muirhead.

The Club proudly works closely with other community groups to help organize local community events such as Winterfest and the Community Garage Sale.



Welcome to the Baysville Riverfront Group

It all started in 1999. The Baysville Community Group was instrumental in pulling the various Baysville organizations together to decide on a Millennium 2000 Project. From a list of proposals from each group, it was decided to go forward with a riverfront project. A subcommittee was formed under the leadership of Chris and Jan Dann. An application



was submitted for a Millennium Grant but the group was turned down. However, they decided to persevere and the riverfront project got underway. It was then that the subcommittee re-formed as the Baysville Riverfront Group

The vision of the newly-formed Riverfront Group was to put in place the infrastructure that would provide access to the town of Baysville from the water. A large number of Baysville residents volunteered to work alongside the Riverfront Group, as the docks and retaining wall were constructed.

Another objective was to enhance the aesthetics along the riverfront. This was accomplished by putting in a variety of gardens. The Group provides the resources to maintain these gardens on a yearly basis.

In 2010 the Riverfront Group, in collaboration with the Baysville Community group, helped to spearhead an initiative that resulted in the construction of the bandshell and the public washrooms through a G8 grant.

For these projects, as well as others, the missing ingredient was the monies to fund them. Hence a variety of fundraising strategies were put in place over time. The first major activity was the Surf & Turf Dinner with a silent auction - the first one being held in 2000. Then a year later the Riverfront Group took over the Arts & Crafts Festival from Dick

Robinson. It was and still is great to see the abundance of summer activities in Baysville, not forgetting that the Walkabout, organized by the Baysville Community Group, is a popular venue as well.

The Riverfront Group has supported the community of Baysville and the Township of Lake of Bays in a variety of ways. Substantial donations have assisted the Curling Club, the Horticultural Society, Fire Station 40, the Community Centre, the After School Programs, the Library, the Anglican Church food bank, children's swimming lessons, as well as individual families. The Group also offers bursaries for students entering a post-secondary program.



 - Brownies, Cubs, Dramatones, Square Dancing and Clogging there weren't any ads but it did include birthdays, anniversaries and birth announcements, recipes and household hints


pumpkin event and of course, our big even is our annual Santa Claus Parade - the only parade that goes around twice!
