E very year the Baysville Community Group strives to meet our mandate to "promote, beautify and enhance the Village of Baysville" and while it is very rewarding to be a part of all these activities, it is getting more and more challenging for as the volunteer base continues to dwindle - a problem for many small community based groups.

The Baysville Community Group generally meets once a month to plan our many activities and we are always looking for volunteers to help with our various projects.

We welcome all volunteers of all ages. Whether you are a summer resident and only have only a few hours to help set up for the Walkabout or greet visitors at a gate, or are a more permanent resident and have time to be a regular part of our group, or even if you have an idea you would like to share, everyone has something to offer and we would love to hear from you.

- **Baysville Walkabout**: Our biggest event, the Baysville Walkabout, is held on the fourth Saturday of July and has always been a real community event as it requires the commitment and support of almost everyone who lives in Baysville! While we had to cancel the Walkabout in 2020 and in 2021, we were back in 2022 and this year we will celebrate our **33rd** year on July 22, 2023.
- South Shore Times: For 30 years this little community-oriented newspaper has been produced to keep locals, seasonal residents and visitors informed about all of the amazing things that happen in our village throughout the year. There is so much going on, it seems to expand a little more every year! We are always looking for items of interest so please get in touch!
- **Baysville Community Yard Sale:** Always a hugely popular event, in 2022 we had a whopping 37 yard sales going in simultaneously in and around Baysville, bringing thousands of bargain hunters into the village.
- Flower Planters, Community Sign Garden and Seasonal Street Decor: Every season Baysville's

natural beauty is enhanced with flower planters and baskets in the summer, scarecrows on cornstalks in the fall and Christmas greenery and bows in the winter.

- **Baysville Cemeteries Water Project:** In 2021, following a delegation before the Township of Lake of Bays council, we were successful in having water spigots installed in each of the three cemeteries.
- **Baysville 150 Celebrations:** We provided financial support for the various activities that were organized for Baysville's 150th year in 2021.
- Canada Day Fireworks: We provide financial support for this very popular event held annually down by the dam
- **Remembrance Day:** We participate in the wreath laying at the Cenotaph and assist with providing food and kitchen help for the reception afterwards
- **Baysville Winterfest**: We assist with the children's craft activities.

Sadly this year we say "Farewell" to Jeanie MacIver one of our long serving members of the BCG, who is moving out of the area. Jeanie has worked tirelessly for Baysville for the past 17 years and although we wish her all the best, we will miss her dearly. Not boring is right! She is also known for her use of a





She will be moving to Orangeville to be with her son Ian and Amy and their children Grace, Lily and Nolan. Her daughter Tracy and Dave live in the next town over. "I'm looking forward to having my grandsons Joshua and Zachery chauffeur me around. Instead of driving Miss Daisy, they will be driving Miss Jeanie," she laughs.

"But I am definitely going to miss this place, " she says of both her home and of Baysville. I'm going to miss looking out my back window into the bush and over my gardens. It's so peaceful. But mostly, I am going to miss the people. The friends I have made, the people who have been there for me every step of the way.

"All my neighbours on Fairy Falls Road have become family to me, as have my friends in the village and I will miss them all very much," Jeanie says with fondness. She also sings praises of her snow removal guy, who always checks in on her, whether it snows or not, and another friend, they call each other every single day, just to check in. These acts of friendship mean more to her than people will ever realize.

The washrooms are also in need of updating. A fund-raising committee 'Team Operation Facelift' was formed with members Mayor Terry Glover, myself, Parks and Facilities. Superintendent Scott MacKinnon, active community volunteer Judy Ruttan-Vanclieaf and Baysville Lions Secretary, Cyndi Ruttan.



Some other updates: I'm still learning more about the geography of McLean Ward and have about 4 more 'category 3' lakes to paddle with hopes of achieving this goal during the summer. Hopefully, my paddle buddy Judy Ruttan-Vanclieaf will join me. As Co-Chair of

the Lake of Bays Heritage Advisory Committee I updated the Baysville Historical Walking Guide and our committee has taken on researching and creating 'If These Stones Could Talk' guides for the many cemeteries around Lake of Bays. These guides will provide information for those interested in locating and learning about their descendants and in most cases early settlers of Lake of Bays. It's important to note that this committee helps promote tourism via culture and heritage. The lake association AGM's will be on my radar and I've noticed that 'education' has become most important in regards to water quality and the shoreline environment. Guest speakers also bring educational information to the lake association members.

In closing, I'm looking forward to another great year ahead working with McLean Ward's constituents, my fellow Council members and staff. Seventy Years of Cottage Memories

My adventures on Echo Lake and in Baysville are no different from many others, yet we each have unique experiences. Some remember outhouses and iceboxes, no electricity, and, if we're fortunate, utter privacy. There are still days when we say, "Listen! You can't hear a sound!", and it's true. What a blessing.



My family's early days here were so

isolated that, as a teenager, I constantly yearned for the sound of a car, any car, because that meant a visitor! I couldn't wait to find a summer job elsewhere. Because we were only here for brief periods and rarely left the lake, we had no idea what a full village life was available to those raised here with drama clubs, bands, church, skating, and hockey.

I've written before of our early building adventures. Now, I'd like to share more of the fun times, like bingo, movies on a small screen in the community centre, and Saturday night dances with music by the school band. As youngsters, we occasionally sat outside in the car with our parents, enjoying the music, until the fights burst out into the parking lot!

Practical jokes, usually instigated by our friends, Bob and Ray Barlow, often went awry. My husband, Paul, and his brother, Barry, were city friends regularly invited to Barlows' cottage. One evening, these four drove to Echo Lake and hid outside Effie and Percy Tyrell's house. When Ray pulled out his trumpet and blared When the Saints Come Marching In, they weren't expecting Percy to race out with his shotgun and had to flee!

The Barlows once hung a realistic effigy of a man, made from old clothes stuffed with paper, from a tree on our driveway, so that on Friday night, Dad's headlights would hit it. Luckily, Pat Tyrrell spotted it and warned us.

The boys once asked Billy Langmaid if it was legal to shoot a goose they'd spotted in the river behind his store. Billy responded by grabbing his own gun and shooting it. As the boys pulled it from the river, Billy announced shooting geese was illegal! That evidence was hurriedly disposed of in the oven. As it happened, Mr. Fairy was fond of that goose and had been feeding it. He was devastated, so Bob apologized with a box of chocolates. Another time, the boys gorged on Mrs. Tyrrell's bread, still warm from the oven, slathered with jam, then smoked several cigars, drank copious amounts of ginger beer, and spent the night throwing up, with one unfortunate, sleeping on a lower bunk, on the receiving end from the upper one.


Mom loved organizing campfires, and dad loved playing guitar. As our

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

The Echo Lake Road Log Home

We are the proud third generation owners of the "Log Home" on Echo Lake Road.

My grandfather, Ernest Levi Bell was born in Baysville on August 8, 1888 and was raised on the Bell Farm on Heney Lake Road. His parents were Joseph Bell (1837-1923 and Mary Ellen Thurlwell (1858-1897).

My grandmother, Mary Latina Devitt (1892-1984) was born in Thornton ON and moved to Muskoka in 1898 with her mother (a widow) and her five siblings.

Ernest (Ernie) and Mary (Minnie) were married on October 12, 1910. They first settled in the village then moved to the log home on Echo Lake Road in 1928. My father, Henry, was seven at the time. It was a full house with brothers Vic and Cliff and sisters Stella, Pearl, Mary and Jaclyn. They rented the home from Sadie Irene Kelly for \$6 a month until 1934 when they purchased the house and 100 acres for \$600.

These were hard working times for families. They were considered farmers but Grandma also took in laundry for cottagers without any modern conveniences like running water and electricity! My grandfather was a jack of all trades and in the winter months he worked cutting ice for local refrigeration. Unfortunately, he found his fate too soon when on his way to work on March 15, 1951, he fell through the ice and drowned. My grandmother lived in the house until the 1970s when she moved to The Pines in Bracebridge. We would always pick her up there and bring her more on weekend visits.

My parents, Henry and Phyllis Bell took over the ownership of the house in 1971. This was an exciting time for us because my father installed indoor plumbing! No more outhouses! We have spent many weekends, summer vacations and winter vacations here in Baysville and I have so many amazing memories. As a family growing up we have travelled coast to coast but there was nowhere that mad my Dad as happy as being in Baysville. It was home. Her certainly passed on that love to his children.


My husband and I have been bringing our own children and now our grandchildren here for weekends and summer vacations for 36 years. Our kids would agree that it will always be a favourite destination.

After my mom's passing in 2014 (Dad passed away in 1987) it was exciting time for us when we become the new owners of the "Bell Homestead". Our dream has always been to retire here and in July of this year we became full time residents. We are looking forward to many more great years and memories!

Huntsville/Lake of Bays Fire Station 4 News

I can't believe the last Station 4 update was 2020. A lot has happened in the past couple of years. We have restructured your fire department, and renumbered our fire halls. This restructure was designed to streamline our operations, standardize our apparatus and firefighter identification.



What was Station 40 is now Station 4.

There was new Provincial Legislation passed

in 2022 requiring all Fire Departments certify their members (Full time, Part Time, Volunteer) to the NFPA standard. For some departments this is going to be a difficult task. We, at Huntsville/Lake of Bays Fire, have certified our members to the NFPA standard for 10 years so the legislation has no measurable impact on our operation.

At Station 4, we continue to be staffed by a strong contingent of professional, dedicated firefighters. If you are interested in joining our team, talk to one of our members or drop by the hall any Tuesday night.

Our emergency response continues to focus on medical emergencies, motor vehicle crashes, fires, and rescue. With the increased popularity of snowmobiling in winter

and ATV's we are seeing an increase in these types of rescue.

Each year we respond to a number of wild land fires that we often have extinguished within hours. In both 2021 and 2022, however, we were faced with multi-day wild land fire incidents. The Bigwin Island Fire in 2022 took 2 days and firefighters from Stations 1, 2, 3, and 4. One thing that made this significant is that it happened in

November. Our wild land fire season is generally wrapped up by that time. Is this our new norm? Time will tell.

Another significant event in 2022 was the Baysville General Store fire. The members of Station 4 had preplanned this building for years and due to its construction (it started life as a barn) have always dreaded an event. Given the age, construction, and a century of renovation we believed that if there was ever a fire in the building it may be too much for us to get in front of and save. Due to the outstanding effort by your Station 4 Firefighters, we not only saved the building but contained the damage so that, as we understand, the new owner is in a position to bring the business back to life.

2022 saw Station 4 retire our old Tanker (used to shuttle water) and replaced it with a new Pumper. The Station 4 fleet now consists of two Pumpers, one Rescue and one ATV. The replacement of our old Tanker with an additional Pumper expands our capability to service our community.


It is our hope, that we may open our membership drive in the fall of 2023. With that, we may have a new board and future events planned.

In 2019 a small group of Baysville citizens created a committee to plan celebration activities for Baysville's 150th in 2021. David Ferguson, Councillor Jacquie Godard, Belinda MacKinnon, Stasi O'Hare, Cathy R. Vanclieaf and Judy Vanclieaf began meeting monthly and had high hopes planning many social events throughout 2021.

When the Covid-19 pandemic struck, we realized that we would have to re-think the year entirely. Instead of inperson gatherings, we focused on community enhancement, virtual and self-guided activities to mark this milestone.

Baysville's 150th Anniversary Celebration 2021 was a success story that took us all on a 'virtual journey back in time'.

The year kicked off at 12:01 a.m. on January 1, 2021 with the lighting of the "Baysville 150" sign in Grist Mill Park and over the course of year we hosted several events that could be enjoyed from home.

Our self-guided cemetery tour, aptly named 'If These Stones Could Talk', prepared by Cathy Vanclieaf from information provided by other committee members and historical records was well received and will be ongoing for anyone wishing to visit and learn about their early settler descendants (guides are provided at the Community Cemetery entrance). Cathy was our treasurer and editor so was kept very busy during this special year.

Shirley Burton, the great-granddaughter of William H. Brown, who is considered to be the found of Baysville, spearheaded a movement to adorn all three cemeteries with live flowers throughout the spring, summer and fall season. It was beautiful to see all of our cemeteries with such an abundant display of more than 100 hanging potted flowers to pay our respects to our loved ones. Watering them daily was a huge task and thanks to the small group of volunteers who nurtured them. Judy Vanclieaf collected more than 65 local family histories and stories and created a connection between the past and the present, resulting in an amazing book entitled '*Baysville Next Generation*' that is a lasting contribution to the story of our wonderful little village. 



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

Water Installed In The Baysville Cemeteries



In the spring of 2021, local resident, Shirley Burton spearheaded a "Baysville 150" cemetery beautification project that involved hanging flower baskets on as many graves as possible in Baysville's three cemeteries. This endeavour was advertised through the various churches, on Facebook and also spread by word of

mouth. Family and friends ordered baskets and there were also a number of baskets provided by generous donors who provided flowers for graves that had no one left to tend to them.

Every day from May to September, a small group of volunteers watered and pruned the plants, however with the strain of having to haul water up and out of donated rain barrels and then water over 100 flower baskets between three cemeteries, it was apparent that a better source for water was needed.

On behalf of the watering volunteers and under the umbrella of the Baysville Community Group, I spoke before the Township of Lake of Bays Council in September 2021 requesting that they include the construction of a water system for the Baysville cemeteries in the budget for 2022. Council agreed to investigate the matter further and on December 7, 2021 Scott MacKinnon, Superintendent of Parks and Facilities presented the following to council:

The water system costs as per December 7th Council Agenda Item 6. (d) (iii) District of Muskoka Municipal Water Pipe Supply and Installation - Financial Implications: The initial cost to the Township 2022 capital budget would be estimated at \$9,512 to install the pipe and faucets in the Baysville cemeteries.

Council agreed that while the township and district will do the work, the cost to do so would need to be covered by community support under the umbrella of the Baysville Community Group. It was through the generous donations from various groups and individuals that we were able to raise the necessary funds, and in the Spring of 2022 water taps were installed in all three of the cemeteries.

This was truly a village endeavour and many thanks to the following groups and individuals who donated funds to make it a reality: Baysville Community Group, Baysville Horticultural Group, Baysville Lions Club, Baysville 150 Committee, Bethune United Church, t. Cronin, Godard family, Lake of Bays Association, B. MacKinnon, Norway Point Church, C. Reid, Roper and Burton families, St. Kateri Roman Catholic Church, L.S. Snitman, St. Ambrose Anglican Church, J. Truscott, C. McWillians, D. VanWyck. Thanks also to the Township of Lake of Bays Council and staff and The District of Muskoka.

In 2022 the cemeteries were once again decorated with flower baskets that were tended to by a small, dedicated group of volunteers, and with the addition of the water faucets, maintaining them over the summer was so much easier! If you have loved ones buried in Baysville, or if you would like to adorn the grave of someone who has no one else to acknowledge their life in Baysville, please consider purchasing a hanging basket and shepherd hook and continue to nourish this beautiful addition to our village.




